Miller School of Medicine to host the 12th Annual Liberty City Health Fair. For over 40 years, medical students at the University of Miami have been committed to providing quality health care services to patients throughout South Florida. Last Fall, D. A. Dorsey Technical College was honored to share these free health services with people in the community. The University of Miami was able to offer a variety of free services including diabetes and cholesterol testing; male exams; female exams; skin cancer screenings; bone density tests; mental health screenings; memory

screenings; emergency preparedness; pediatric educations; vision and glaucoma screenings; height, weight, and blood pressure screenings; and dental check-ups. All free services were made available to the community regardless of insurance or immigration status. As a result, the health fair was a huge success toward helping improve the health and wellbeing of hundreds of individuals throughout the community. Furthermore, everyone who participated received free groceries, books, and toys as an incentive for attending the Health Fair. Plans to sponsor this event next year are already underway. Thanks to D. 

History of Lindsey Hopkins Technical College

Lindsey Hopkins, Sr. was born in Reidsville, North Carolina, in 1879. After college, he started a family with Leonora Balsey, and they moved to Atlanta. Investing in the stock market allowed him to become a millionaire. He became the director of Coca-Cola and had investments in Sperry Corporation, North American Aviation, several banks, and insurance companies, leading eventually to his philanthropy.

Lindsey Hopkins, Jr. continues his father's legacy with business ventures in automobile racing and the NFL, as well as philanthropic endeavors.

In 1940, the Miami Dade County School System approached Lindsey Hopkins, Jr. to purchase the Roosevelt Hotel and create a vocational school. Hopkins sold the building for a whopping \$225,000. The school eventually became the largest vocational institute of its time.

The annual Major Appliance and Refrigeration Technician Region V SkillsUSA Competition" was held at Miami Lakes Educational Center on February 23rd, 2022. The contest, consisting of nine stations, featured students from Robert Morgan Educational Center & Technical College as well as Miami Lakes Educational Center & Technical College. Six of the stations were designed to test the participants competency in diagnosing mechanical and operating problems. Students were given several challenges in which a fault was purposely assigned to an appliance which prompted them to display their troubleshooting abilities. The remaining stations — brazing, job interview, and the written technical test also played a major role in the SkillsUSA Competition.

Several Major appliance service companies were represented at the contest as they served as contest judges and advisory committee members. The advisory committee consisted of LG, Hobart, TMM Appliance Services, RR Appliance Services, Laser Appliance, and Flamingo Appliance.

Miami Lakes Tech's Evelio Horta won 1st place as his classmate Mr. Jorge Diaz came in 2nd place. They were followed by Robert Morgan Tech's student Kevin
