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The 2026–2027 ELITE Opening of Schools Mini-Session brought together approximately 370 administrators and teachers for a day of professional learning, collaboration, and preparation for the new school year. Hosted by the Office of Postsecondary Career and Technical Education (OPCTE) team, the event embraced the theme “Built to Perform,” highlighting a year focused on strengthening programs, enhancing instruction, and preparing students for success from learning to earning.

The energy was evident from the start as participants received individualized schedules and pink pom-poms, setting the tone for a day centered on teamwork and celebration. The team kicked off the event as the day's “construction crew,” using the theme to represent the work of building strong programs, equipping educators with the right tools, and creating pathways to student success.

Throughout the day, Adult General Education and Career and Technical Education teachers and administrators participated in six learning development sessions featuring resources, strategies, and emerging practices they could bring back to their classrooms and programs. Building Bridges to Success: Project BRIDGE Celebrates a Year of Growth

Since its launch in April 2025, the Building Readiness for Independent Development, Growth & Employment (BRIDGE) at Miami Lakes Educational Center & Technical College has experienced remarkable growth. Supported through a partnership with the Florida Center for Students with Unique Abilities, the program has expanded from two students enrolled in two Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs to 13 students participating in five career pathways: Electronic Systems Technology, HVAC/R, Master Automotive Service Technology, Medical Assisting, and Professional Culinary Arts and Hospitality.

Project BRIDGE is an inclusive postsecondary transition program that helps students with intellectual disabilities develop technical skills, workplace readiness, self-advocacy, and independence while learning alongside their peers in college-level CTE programs. Through individualized support, Person-Centered Planning, and strong partnerships with families and community organizations, students are empowered to pursue meaningful career and employment goals.

This year, students celebrated important milestones during the program's first CTE Signing Day and the Pathways to Success Celebration, which recognized Occupational Completion Point achievements, industry credentials, and personal growth.

This July, Project BRIDGE will mark another significant achievement as seven students complete the program and transition to the next stage of their education and career journeys. Their success reflects the program's mission of building bridges between education, employment, and independence.

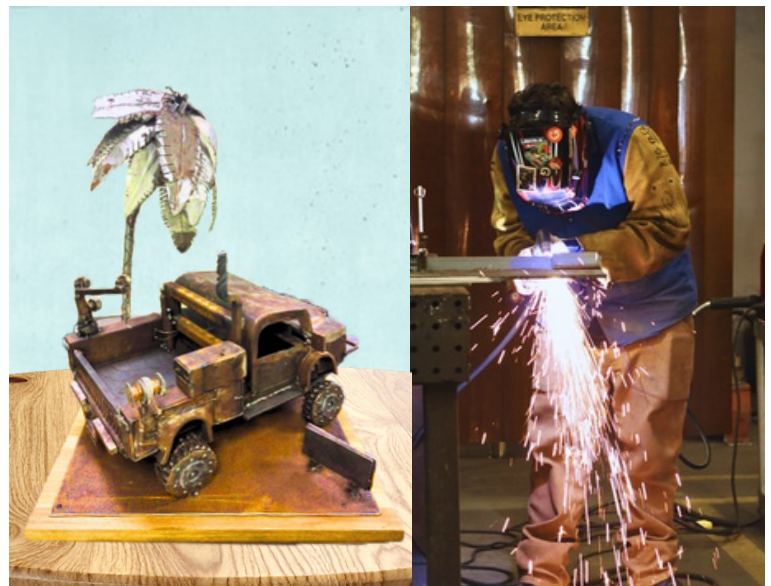

Constructed entirely from scrap metal and recycled materials found in the welding classroom, the project reflects the creativity, technical skills, and teamwork of the Welding Program students. The detailed display features a mobile welding rig beneath a South Florida palm tree and the college's iconic emblem, symbolizing the hardworking skilled trades professionals who have helped build America.

Under the guidance of Instructor Guerrero, his students transformed discarded materials into a unique piece of industrial art while showcasing the hands-on skills they have developed in the classroom. Although the MLEC&TC team did not receive the competition's top award, their work deserves recognition for its craftsmanship, originality, and tribute to the welding profession.

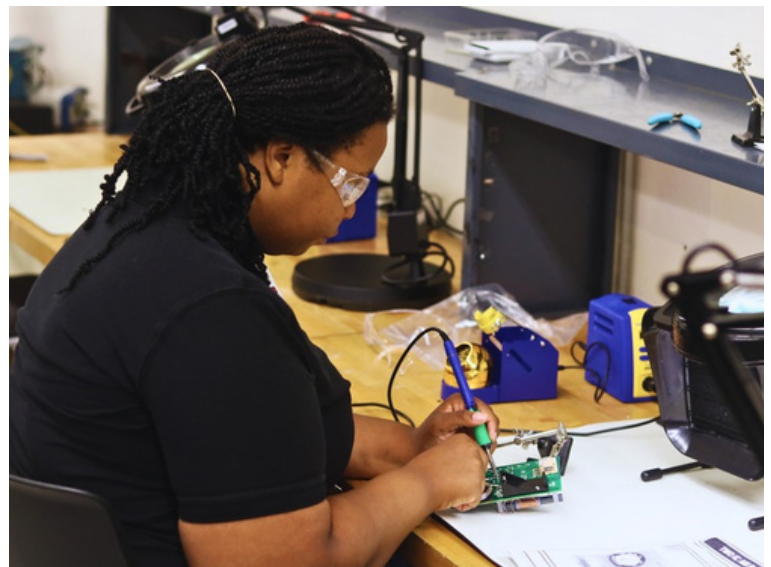
